Writing during this current heat-wave is energy sapping. But what about those who have to work? The postman, the builders I see most mornings hefting cement and bricks, the office workers without air conditioning, nurses, care-workers having to keep going no matter what, bus drivers, waitresses, porters, child-minders... Those of you having to work in this heat have my sympathy and I tell myself that I shall never again complain. (But I shall, of course.)

A week or two ago I was leading worship when the New Testament reading was the story about Jesus arriving at the home of Mary and Martha (St. Luke's gospel, ch. 10). Martha, who welcomes him, has a moan because whilst she is doing all the work, her sister just sits and listens to Jesus. Jesus, in my view, responds to Martha somewhat insensitively by saying that the only needful thing is what Mary is doing. No more is said.

My sympathies have always been with Martha. Do understand: I grew up amongst some deeply spiritual people. But those same people were eminently practical as well. Of course there are times when we need to listen, or be listened to, and of course that is the great contribution that some make (and for some it's all they, for whatever reasons, are able to make). But I don't think we value enough those who sweep the floors, wash up, cut the grass, clean the loos, make the tea, set the table, take notes, dress the hurts; in other words, those and all other jobs which we simply expect to be done and take for granted. We don't even notice when they have been done—only when they haven't. So (whilst continuing to value the Marys) let's hear it for the Marthas of this world, whose ministries more often than not go unnoticed, unsung and unregarded.

Welcome to Revd. Anne Curtis - New Curate at the RSK Benefice

Meet Anne Curtis, who has recently begun her curacy at the RSK Benefice – Radley, Sunningwell and Kennington Churches. It was a delight to speak with Anne who agreed to be interviewed for the Kennington Chronicle.

After reading Natural Sciences at Queens' College, Cambridge, and completing a PGCE at Homerton College, Anne then spent most of her working life as a Maths and Physics teacher,

including a year teaching in Kenya. She has lived in Kingston Bagpuize since 2001 with her husband, Tom, and their two daughters, both of whom are now at university.

From about 2010, Anne began to do some local preaching at her church in Kingston Bagpuize and was actively encouraged by others to pursue this and become a Licensed Lay Minister (LLM). Anne engaged in courses with the Oxford Diocese's Local Pathway and became a LLM in 2017. Anne told me that she very much enjoyed being a LLM which brought her new experiences, such as being a day chaplain at Christ Church Cathedral and helping to teach on Oxford Local Pathway's preaching course. This led her to consider ordination and curacy.



Earlier this year, Anne completed two years of ordination training at Ripon College, Cuddesdon and gained a BA in theology, ministry and mission. And in a most joyful service on 2nd July, she was ordained by Stephen, Bishop of Oxford, at Christ Church Cathedral. This was followed by a combined service of the RSK Benefice in St Swithun's Church on 3rd July. In the photograph, Anne is flanked by Revd. Alison Mathew and Revd. Rob Glenny of the RSK Benefice.

Anne has just begun her curacy here which will last four years. She told me that she has already discovered what a lively benefice this is with a wide variety of events and services. During this first part of her curacy she will be shadowing Revd. Rob Glenny and his team and she is excited to see how they do things, to watch and to learn. Anne said, "I have already been amazed by the St Swithun's Community Larder project, and last week Rob baptised a toddler in a paddling pool at Messy Church in Kennington. I've never seen either of those before!"

Anne is looking forward to playing a full part in the benefice, but at the moment she is very busy getting to know people, learning their names and hearing their stories of how they came to Kennington. She fits in her love of travelling, knitting and gardening in her spare time.

Kennington offers you a very warm welcome, Anne, and we wish you an enjoyable and successful curacy!

Maurice moved to Kennington in 1955 when he and new wife Ann were two of the earliest residents to move into the new Upper Road site, and this is where they stayed. Father was a keen gardener, when time away from Morris Motors / Leyland Cars / British Leyland allowed. In later life he enjoyed working in the lodge at Trinity College, and after that on the gates of the college, helping and directing tourists.

An avid Oxford City FC supporter (and one time player), he was able to enjoy the last home game of the regular season against St Albans City - an exciting 3:1 win - and then take in the final frames of the world snooker final just the day before the stroke occurred.

Maurice's cremation took place at South Oxfordshire Crematorium on 6th June, followed by a celebration of his life with family, near neighbours, and close friends at his house.

I am sure that many of the older Kennington residents will recognise him from these pictures. Hopefully they will be able, at some time in the near future, to raise a glass to cheer the wonderful life of Maurice.

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
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Kennington Community Larder

Summer Gala Concert - 9th July 2022

But Oh! what an exhilarating time we all had on the afternoon of Saturday 9th July! Whilst others were sitting glued to televisions watching the Wimbledon women's final (yes, we might have chosen a better Saturday for our summer concert), the Kennington Choirs and a goodly sized audience were enjoying a highly entertaining mixed bag of light operatic and musical theatre pieces in St Swithun's Church.

For two concerts now, since the passing of our inspirational founder and leader Trevor Cowlett, the choir has been led and further inspired by Claire Sutton-Williams, already a notable soloist in some of our previous concerts. She put together a lovely programme of pieces from Purcell to Handel to Mozart to Wagner to G & S to Novello to Gershwin to Loesser, including some arrangements of traditional nautical songs. The whole lyrical gallimaufry was loosely tied – sometimes very loosely tied indeed, if truth be told - into a fable, beguilingly narrated by Wendy Lewis, that revolved around the love of a sailor for his lass. There was wooing, carousing, dancing, storm, tribulation, mermaids, enchantment, heartbreak, skulduggery, and beauty of a truly ethereal kind . . . very little of which was on offer in the Wimbledon tennis final! Most of all, there was conjoined musical fun and laughter for a scintillating couple of hours.

We were all – choir and audience alike – thrilled and honoured to be treated to some solos and duets from the same sort of repertoire by both Claire herself and a close professional colleague of hers, Anthony Harris (see photo). Their superb soprano and tenor voices filled our little church and reminded us what the human voice can do when it is truly gifted. But these occasions are also warm social jamborees, and at the interval we all drifted outside to enjoy friendly chat with a glass or two of chilled wine or fruit juice, and a rich array of home-made cakes to match the musical feast we were already enjoying. Suitably refreshed and nourished, folk readily emptied their pockets and purses to the tune of £450, for the benefit of our chosen charity on this occasion, Helen and Douglas House: a splendid sum. Thank you to all.



The second half probably benefited from the cake and wine that had been enjoyed in the interval: choruses were sung with admirable vim and gusto, and few noticed when the odd note went astray or we all momentarily forgot what was up next. This is the Kennington choir enjoying themselves, not Scholar Cantorum. The entire repertoire was, however, beautifully and faultlessly accompanied on the piano by our very own Denise Evans, and the soloists by the peerless Jamal Sutton, a loyal supporter of all the choir's work over the years.

The afternoon was a delightful success in all respects. If you think we sound a little bit pleased with ourselves, it's because we are, and deservedly so. I think dear Trevor would have been proud of us. We owe a huge thank you to Claire for her musical skills and her indefatigable patience and fortitude in putting the whole show together, and to Denise, Jamal and Anthony for lifting the performance standard of our show to something approaching sublimity (only approaching, mind – not there yet!) We resume activities for the autumn season on Friday 9th September in the Methodist Church. This is an OPEN rehearsal inviting possible new members to join us for an evening of fun singing: we could do with some new blood, and we genuinely welcome all-comers. You don't need to be able to read music, rehearsals are great fun and very sociable (plenty of time to make new friends and chat), and you'll be made to feel truly welcome. The physical and emotional uplift you can feel after a good sing has to be experienced to be believed. You're never going to get onto Centre Court at Wimbledon, so why not give this a go!

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Congratulations to Kennington's Jerry Patterson!

Alderman honour awarded to three ex-councillors

Three former Vale of White Horse councillors who served the district for a combined total of 52 years have been honoured as Aldermen.

Jim Halliday, Jerry Patterson and Reg Waite were awarded the title at a recent special Council meeting in recognition of the service they provided to the council and the district.



Jerry Patterson served as a district councillor between 1995 and 2015, representing the Kennington ward until 2003, and then onto Kennington and South Hinksey ward from 2003 to 2015 following a change of district boundaries. During Jerry's time at the Vale, he was Council Leader for four years, as well as a period as Chair on the Abingdon and North East Area Committee. He was also a member on several other groups, including the Planning Committee and Reservoir Advisory Group.

Cllr Emily Smith, Leader of Vale of White Horse District Council, said: "Jim, Jerry and Reg were all very active and passionate representatives of their local wards and the Vale of White Horse District Council. Throughout their time, they all worked across several key roles with great dignity. They've set a great example for current councillors to follow and that's why we're delighted to award all three an Alderman title to publicly recognise the significant contribution they've made to people, businesses, and communities across our district."

In receiving the honour, the trio join Alderwomen Briony Newport and Joyce Hutchinson, who were given the title in 2007 and 2011 respectively. If someone is honoured as an Alderman or Alderwoman they can attend and take part in civic ceremonies, but do not have the right to represent the council at official Council meetings or receive any allowances.

KITCHEN KORNER!

SHRIMP SCAMPI AND ANGEL HAIR

A scrumptious quick meal for the kids and family!

Ingredients:

- 1 tbsp salt & a drizzle of oil for the hot water for pasta
- 3 tbsp butter
- 3 tbsp olive oil
- 4 cloves minced garlic
- 1 lb large shrimp peeled and deveined
- 1 tsp salt
- ¼ tsp pepper
- ¹/₃ cup finely chopped parsley
- ½ tbsp grated lemon zest
- ¼ cup fresh squeezed lemon juice (1-2 lemons)
- ¹/₈ tsp hot red pepper flakes

Method:

- 1. Cook pasta according to directions on packet.
- 2. In a skillet, melt the butter & oil, add the garlic and sauté for 1 min.
- 3. Add shrimp and sprinkle salt & pepper. Sauté until pink (2-3 mins each side).
- 4. Remove shrimp from the skillet and keep warm for a few seconds.
- 5. Mix lemon zest, chopped parsley and pepper flakes in the juices from the shrimp.
- 6. Pour shrimp over the cooked, drained pasta & toss to combine.

A BIG THANK YOU TO KENNINGTON!



"This was our first time as an 'opener'. It was a lovely, sociable day—albeit very busy—and a great way to meet other villagers!"

The words of Annette Gillow. She and her husband are the owners of one of the five gardens that opened for the first time ever for our Kennington Open Gardens Day on 26 June this year. Four other garden owners, already veterans of past Open Garden Days, also welcomed visitors that day, making nine in all. As on past such occasions, people were invited to enjoy St Swithun's Church Grounds, where Wild About Kennington put on a display and teas were served. There were refreshments in some of the other gardens, as well as plant sales and a second-hand book stall, and more wildlife gardening advice in the garden of Sylfest and Alison Muldal.

It all made for a great community event, with lots of people on foot around the village (206 of you bought tickets!), meeting neighbours and making new friends, exchanging gardening tips, chatting over tea and cakes. As opener Alison Peedell said, "We had a great afternoon, catching up with old friends and making new." Meanwhile, in the Sylfests' garden there was pond-dipping for the children and identifying bees with the help of Richard Parton, and at Annette's place, "The children were kept busy enjoying our garden trail to find hidden features amongst all the plants and many played the giant noughts and crosses game!"

The outcome of all this was that the magnificent sum of £1,800 was raised for the Nasio Trust's project to build a community library in Western Kenya (www.thenasiotrust.org). Added to what we had already raised, this takes us well on the way to our eventual target of £10,000. As Norma Sweeney said, *"It was a great pleasure for me to open for this good cause."*

An event like this cannot happen without a lot of work by many people. I counted about 50 people who had made some sort of contribution to the success of the day. First, I have to thank Norma Sweeney, who shared the overall organisation of the day with me as well as opening her own garden. We owe a huge debt of thanks to all the openers. Apart from Norma (and her long-

suffering husband, John) and me, they were Emma Whiteley, Alison and Sylfest Muldal, Annette and Steve Gillow, Molly and John Dewey, Alison and Brian Peedell, Alan and Jackie Mutton and Sylvia and Attam Vetta. The new openers especially were a bit trepidatious beforehand, not knowing quite what they had taken on, but all did a magnificent job in the end.

There isn't room here to list the rest of the fifty or so people involved. People who baked cakes, donated plants and books, served teas, sold tickets, put up notices and took them down again, and so on, so you get the idea of what a community effort this was. Thanks are also due to the publicity support provided by the Nasio Trust, to members of the Kennington Horticultural Society, to St Swithun's Church for the use of the church grounds, to Wild about Kennington, and to Kennington Parish Council for giving us a grant to cover our printing costs.

How lucky we were to have chosen a date before our gardens were afflicted by heat and drought! As Norma said, "The weather was perfect for garden visiting, sunny with a breeze now and again, which changed the play of light on the plants, creating changing pictures for our visitors."

And my own feelings about the event? I love sharing my garden with other people, so it was wonderful to welcome so many people of all ages, from toddlers to octogenarians. And I remain eternally grateful to the many people who in some cases allowed themselves to be cajoled into being involved and in others embraced the opportunity enthusiastically. Thank you Kennington for your generosity.


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
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The Importance of Libraries for Upward Mobility

Food of Love cooks up a life across gender, class and race.

With food comes love and with love comes hope.

Claret Press will publish my memoir Food of Love in the Autumn. It is the story of a working-class girl who would not have enjoyed the life she has without access to Luton Central Library. That awareness led to my passion to help save Oxfordshire libraries. Korky Paul leading the Pied Piper procession to tea in Kennington Village Centre was, I believe, instrumental in changing the leader of the council's mind. At least Keith Mitchell hinted as much to me. FOKL's honorary life president, Korky Paul has illustrated the 'library' chapter towards the end.

My publisher is an indie (because I am not Chinese) but Brushstrokes in Time attracted seventy '5' star reviews on Amazon. It is now endorsed by John Gittings, the former chief foreign correspondent of the Guardian, as well as quietly by the courageous Stars artists (Ai Weiwei was one of them). The Professor of Modern Chinese History at Oxford, Rana Mitter, has endorsed my memoir – just one of the amazing local, national and international endorsements. I cook up a story across gender, class and race because of mine and my husband Atam's intimate experience of the changes in our society related to those themes. Each chapter ends with a recipe provided by family and friends which show how our society has been enriched by immigration.

Kennington has been my home since 1970 and features a lot so I'll launch Food of Love with food on 1st October in the Village Centre. There will be a raffle for the Nasio library project. For 50 years through KOA, this village changed the lives of hundreds of thousands of people for the better. It was a brilliant example that you can effect change given the will and determination. When Not so Black and White was published, I suggested that co-author Nancy Mudenyo Hunt give copies to community libraries in west Kenya. The problem was that there are none – no libraries - so a group of us in the village set about raising the money to build the first.

The successful 'Open Gardens' in June, organised by former KOA chair, Marilyn Farr, was one of our fundraising efforts. For the ambitious but deprived children in Mumias in west Kenya, access to the library, its books and computers will open the world to them just as Luton Central Library did for me. I doubt I would have passed my 11 plus and would be writing this now without access to a library.

I shall lead the November FOKL author talk but I won't be talking about my life but yours. I want to encourage others to write their memoirs and give some advice on how and why you should begin. If you aren't already a friend of our library PLEASE do join. It only costs £3 per annum. 

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The Oxford Inklings

Oxford has a long and distinguished history of famous authors and poets, including C.S. Lewis, J.R.R Tolkien, Owen Barfield, Charles Williams, Lord David Cecil, and Lewis Carroll but also the writings of Percy Shelley, Oscar Wilde, Vera Brittain, Robert Graves, John Betjeman, George Macdonald, G. K. Chesterton and Dorothy L. Sayers to name but a few. More recent alumni include Wendy Cope (*Making Cocoa for Kingsley Amis*), Jill Paton Walsh (*Lord Peter Wimsey series*), Colin Dexter (*Inspector Morse series*) and Phillip Pullman (*Book of Dust Trilogy*).

A walk from Kennington along the River Thames to Folly Bridge and then into the city of Oxford leads to Christ Church College Gardens. These gardens also lead up to Merton College, one of the oldest in Oxford (founded in 1264), which is where JRR Tolkien lectured as a Professor of Anglo Saxon History. Walk a little further on from Merton College and you will arrive at Magdalen College where CS Lewis was a Fellow and Tutor in English Literature. These two great literary giants formed a deep and lasting friendship which continued throughout their lifetimes.

JRR Tolkien (*The Hobbit and Lord of the Rings*) and CS Lewis (*The Chronicles of Narnia and The Ransom Trilogy*) were members of "The Inklings" in Oxford. They were part of a gathering of friends, most of them scholars and academics within Oxford University, many of them creative writers and lovers of imaginative literature. The informal meetings consisted of friendly conversation, the exchange of ideas and, most often, readings of new and original material.

The members of "The Inklings" included C. S. Lewis, J. R. R. Tolkien, Owen Barfield, Charles Williams, Warren Lewis, Hugo Dyson, Lord David Cecil, Roger Lancelyn Green, Adam Fox, R. A. Havard, J. A. W. Bennett, and Nevill Coghill. The core of this legendary literary group was CS Lewis, JRR Tolkien, Owen Barfield (*Saving the Appearances*) and Charles Williams (*All Hallows Eve*). They were united by a love of myth and the belief that it is through the imagination that reality is illuminated.

The Inklings would meet in CS Lewis's rooms in Magdalen College, Oxford during the 1930s and 1940s and in various Oxford pubs, usually The Eagle and Child and sometimes The Lamb and Flag. Both of these pubs are in St. Giles not far from The Ashmolean Museum and The Martyrs Memorial. During the war years beer shortages occasionally rendered the Eagle and Child unable to open and the group instead met at other pubs, including the White Horse in Broad Street and the Kings Arms on the corner of Parks Road and Holywell Street.

Clive Staples Lewis (better known as CS Lewis) loved nothing more than sitting in the back room of his favourite pub, The Eagle and Child, surrounded by his closest literary friends, including JRR



Tolkien. In 1926, Lewis joined the English faculty at Oxford University, which is where he met Tolkien. The most well-known members of this extraordinary group of Oxford academics who loved great stories and great beer were, of course, CS Lewis and JRR Tolkien.

Lewis and Tolkien remained "literary soul mates" until Lewis's death in 1963. They inspired each other, and their relationship remains one of the most significant in twentieth-century literature. Tolkien once wrote of Lewis: "Only from him did I ever get the idea that my '*stuff*' could be more than a private hobby." Another commentator noted, "Without JRR Tolkien, we might never have heard of CS Lewis, but without Lewis, we might never have heard of Tolkien."

News from St Swithun's CE Primary School

In Rowan class we have been thoroughly enjoying our topic 'Creeping, Crawling Creatures.' In DT we created fantastic bug coasters as gifts for a special adult at home. We tested out different materials, created a design, and made them. Afterwards we evaluated our finished product. We enjoyed wrapping them in

tissue paper and tying them with a ribbon for our adults. In Art we made bug sculptures inspired by the artist Edouard Martinet.

Recently, we went on our residential trip to Hillend Outdoor Centre, Farmoor, where we went bughunting, and built some impressive dens. Everyone got involved and showed fantastic imaginative thinking and problem solving skills too. In the evening we had a campfire with some enthusiastic singing, before falling fast asleep as soon as our teachers told us to...

In English, our most recent writing journey was based on the story of The Princess and the Pea. We learnt it off by heart with actions before making changes to it. After this, we changed the pea into a bug, and thought about how that would change the story. The princess didn't fare too well in some of our stories; being bitten all over by the bug in the night, and then deciding not to marry the prince after all!

In Science we have been learning about animals including humans, and their different habitats. One lesson, we went on a walk around our school field looking for micro-habitats. We did this at Hillend too, and some of us even created some tiny dens for hedgehogs when we were denbuilding.

Feeding People is Easy

Another book review for you this month. This time it is Colin Tudge's, 'Feeding People Is Easy'

I have read Colin's books before, and though his writing style infuriates me, if you can wade through his words, there are impactful messages in there. Messages that will stick with you for life. He does have a tendency to use words and phrases I've never heard before and goes well beyond academic speak. It feels to me he could say what he means in far fewer words. I get the feeling he enjoys bamboozling the reader with his grasp of English, saying in a complicated way, what he could say in far simpler terms.

That said, it is a good read, and the challenging message I got from the book, "Feeding People is Easy", is topical and an important one. The ideas are not all emanating from the author, as in my view he's reviewing a lot of other big thinkers' concepts, and marrying them up with his own. He actually does that very well I point out. We can feed ourselves without the abuse to animals and the natural world; that's what I was left thinking after reading this. If we get it right, the quality of life for almost all, if not all societies, will improve. What I like about the book is it pretty much shows what we can all do to help. The book advocates allowing us to do it for ourselves, but it's by no means a manual on how to do that. This book is as much about social justice as it is about food supplies.

The book reinforces that every one of us is undeniably invested in the food supply chains, ethics and production, and that realisation is power. We have the power to directly influence. A lot of the concepts I was aware of before, but it was nice to see them framed in a new way and punctuated by new ideas. Many readers may not even be aware there is a problem at the outset, but by the end of the book I'd hope everyone would be thinking about far reaching, yet simple solutions. It just needs reimagining this feeding ourselves thing, and there is so much more to learn about the subject, and adjusting our own mindsets in relation to it.

I'd say more focus is on the problems than the solutions, but personally, I appreciated the space to come up with my own solutions and do further reading via other writers and thus educate myself about all this. The fact that we are already producing enough food to feed the world yet failing to do so because of how we use and distribute that food, will stay with me for a long time. Some of the author's revelations shocked me, but it succeeds in revealing there's a lot we can do, yet we are a long way from achieving it.

It is a bit like what's going on in the ecosystems in our gardens, parks and greenspaces. The solutions are there; we just need the space, time and desire to get there. The essence of this article is that we all need to look at our priorities and improve on them. There's always more we can do. Happy Gardening!
